

IT'S BEEN ANOTHER SEMESTER OF ACADEMIC ACTIVITY AT AQUINAS WHERE, UNDER THE LEADERSHIP OF SENIOR ACADEMIC TUTORS, SHERIDAN ROSALIA AND BEN WILLIAMS, A RAFT OF NEW INITIATIVES HAS BEEN INTRODUCED TO HELP AQUINIANS ACHIEVE THEIR BEST AT UNIVERSITY.

HERE ARE THE TOP FIVE ACADEMIC MOMENTS OF THE PAST SEMESTER:

1. Launch of the Senior Mentoring Program

April saw the launch of a brand new Senior Mentoring Program at Aquinas, which paired 17 of our senior students with industry professionals from the broader Aquinas community. Designed to give students access to specialised career advice as they prepare to enter the workforce, the Senior Mentoring Program offers our senior students an unprecedented level of support as they work towards finishing university and entering professional life.

2. Hard working freshers and hard working tutors

It's no secret that the first year of college can be rather more about socialising than study, but this

FROM THE ACADEMIC TEAM:

The results from Semester One have been particularly impressive this year. Our cohort of First Year students achieved especially outstanding overall grades, with over 80% attaining a Credit average or higher. One third of Aquinas students achieved a Distinction average or higher, a statistic which reflects both the hard work put in by students and the effectiveness of this year's improved academic program. When comparing this semester's grades from those attained in Semester One last year, it is impressive to note an increase of nearly 10% in the number of students achieving a Distinction average across their four subjects. Special mention must be made of the many students who tutored their peers in over 40 different subjects across the three universities, a factor which has surely helped over three-quarters of our students attain a Credit average or higher. Walking through the College, there is a palpable atmosphere of academic pursuit, and Aquinas students are to be congratulated on striking the right balance between studying and socialising.





DEBATING FLETCHER THOMAS




